
Our Mission: Tzedek America transforms lives, strengthens Jewish identity, and changes the world through immersive social impact-oriented experiences.

Multi-Day Social Justice Journeys

Social justice-themed travel has the power to create a profound and lasting impact on both the travelers and the communities they visit. By immersing oneself in the realities and experiences of marginalized communities, participants gain a deeper understanding of the social, economic, and cultural challenges they face. Our trips go beyond a tourist experience; they foster radical empathy, compassion and a heightened sense of global citizenship. Our fully customizable experiences allow participants to witness the resilience, strength and determination of those working for positive change, Inspiring participants to become advocates and agents of change, leveraging their newfound knowledge and experiences to challenge systemic inequalities, promote inclusivity, and create a more just society.

Every Multi-Day Journey Includes

Setting the Tone

Morning meetings are essential to our itinerary as they create a space for everyone to gather their thoughts, connect with one another, and ground themselves in the purpose of the trip. This is especially important given the weight and gravity of the experiences we will be exploring. Our morning meetings establish a respectful and open-minded environment for the day ahead, enable us to approach each site with sensitivity and a desire to learn.



Debriefing

Debriefing allows participants to process and learn from each other in a safe and structured space. The Tzedek America team will provide resources and tools to enable your staff to facilitate reflection on what was learned and how it can be applied to daily life, deepening participants' appreciation and understanding of their experience.



Balance

While educational and impactful experiences are the focus of our programming, it's equally important to provide an opportunity for participants to relax and decompress from the emotional intensity of the trip. This is the time for friendships to be forged, conversations to continue, and memories to be made. Participants experience the local culture by tasting delicious local cuisine, trying new activities, or exploring a new city together. These experiences help create a sense of community and camaraderie that will last long after the trip has ended.



Tzedek America Will

- Design and deliver an all-inclusive social impact-themed group program for a minimum of twenty five participants (including students and staff.)
- Provide a description of the program and send an itinerary in advance of the program.
- Implement the itinerary, including all meals (unless otherwise negotiated), housing, snacks, and recreational activities while participants are under Tzedek America's guidance.
- Embrace the diversity of our learners, ensuring an inclusive experience for all participants by catering to 'participants' individual food, educational, and emotional needs
- Provide shared accommodations for each participant and staff member.
- Provide transportation for each participant and staff member during their time with Tzedek America, including airport pickup and drop-off.
- Serve as tour guide educators for each site visit.
- Create a customized field guide for each participant, including Jewish texts, statistics, and a reflection piece.

Content and Materials

Field Guides

Our carefully curated field guides provide participants with the scaffolding needed to elevate each experience by intertwining historical context, relevant terminology, and Jewish texts. These guides serve as an educational resource, a tool with prompts for debriefing, journal space to record thoughts and feelings, QR codes for further research on the places and topics we eplore, and a way to keep in touch with the people and organizations we meet on our journey.

Drawing inspiration from ancient and modern teachings, Jewish values, and Mussar (spiritual development through Jewish virtues and ethics), these texts inspire participants to reflect on the interconnectedness of humanity and our imperative to strive for a more equitable society.

CIVIL RIGHTS JOURNEY IN THE AMERICAN SOUTH

Journey through the heart of the Civil Rights Movement. Explore the poignant history and immerse in pivotal sites echoing the resilience of activists who challenged systemic oppression.

Essential Questions

How did the Civil Rights Movement inspire other marginalized groups?

How did the Civil Rights Movement help us move forward as a country?

What were some of the major successes of the Civil Rights Movement?

What is the Jewish obligation to further the work of the Civil Rights Movement?

Judaic Context

Judaism teaches respect for the fundamental rights of others as each person's duty to God: "What is hateful to you, do not do to your neighbor" (Babylonian Talmud, Shabbat 31a).

The Torah teaches, that equality is based on the concept that all of God's children are "created in the image of God" (Genesis 1:27).

The Talmud teaches that "the very purpose of the Torah is to promote peace and justice in the world" (Talmud, Berakhot 5a). Similarly, the Civil Rights Movement focused on advocating for civil rights and equality for African Americans.

"From the standpoint of the Torah, there can be no distinction between one human being and another based on race or color. Any discrimination shown to a human being on account of the color of his or her skin constitutes loathsome barbarity." (R. Ahron Soloveichik's Logic of the Heart, Logic of the Mind)

SAMPLE 5-DAY ITINERARY*



Day 1: Memphis, TN

Trace the footsteps of the civil rights movement at historic sites like the Lorraine Motel and the National Civil Rights Museum as we walk the historic streets of Memphis and visit the sites that once bore witness to pivotal moments in the civil rights movement. From the haunting beauty of the Slave Haven Underground Railroad Museum to the vibrant sites and sounds of Beale Street, this experience is a powerful reminder of the progress made and the work that remains on the path toward a more inclusive and just society.



Days 2 & 3: Birmingham, AL

History and culture combine as we explore Birmingham's rich civil rights history and landmarks, including a visit to the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute, the 16th St. Baptist Church, and Kelly Ingram Park. Before heading to Historic Bethel Church, participants will have free time to explore the vibrant 5 Points South neighborhood, unwind at Vulcan Park, or explore Sloss Furnaces. Participants will learn about the Jewish experience during the civil rights movement at one of Birmingham's historic synagogues. A pit stop at the iconic Piggly Wiggly for some shopping before heading to Montgomery, where we'll rest up for another exciting day ahead.



Days 3 & 4: Montgomery & Selma, AL

Embark on a journey through history and human rights in Montgomery, Alabama. We will visit the EJI Legacy Museum, where participants will explore the museum's exhibits and learn about the legacy of slavery, racial injustice, and its ongoing impact on American society. Participants will have the chance to debrief and process their learnings before heading off to the National Memorial for Peace and Justice, where they'll witness the sobering reality of America's history of racial violence and lynchings.

After this intense and thought-provoking experience, take a break and enjoy lunch at the National Memorial before walking to the EJI Auditorium, where you'll be inspired and motivated by the words of an influential speaker who will shed light on the current and ongoing struggle for civil rights and social justice in America.

In addition to visiting the National Memorial, which highlights the hundreds of racially motivated murders that took place in the South, we will personalize and concretize this experience by also visiting a specific lynching memorial in a smaller town. This allows participants to connect with one individual who was lynched and learn about their life, their family, and their community. Next, we will head to the heart of Alabama's civil rights history, Selma, where you'll experience a personalized guided tour that will provide a unique perspective on the historic events that took place here. In Selma, you'll gain a deeper understanding of the sacrifices made by those who fought for their right to vote and how their efforts continue to shape our society today. We will make our way to the Edmund Pettus Bridge, where you'll have the opportunity to walk across the span that played a pivotal role in the struggle for civil rights. This unique experience will be followed by a delicious dinner and fun nighttime activity, where you can decompress and process after a powerful and meaningful day.



Alternative Day 1 or 5: Atlanta, GA

Atlanta is the perfect place to begin or conclude our civil rights journey, as it was at the forefront of the movement for racial equality. Home to many influential civil rights leaders, including Martin Luther King Jr., it was also the site of significant protests and demonstrations. Additionally, Atlanta is home to several critical civil rights landmarks, such as the Ebenezer Baptist Church, where Martin Luther King Jr. served as a pastor, and the Center for Civil and Human Rights.

IMMIGRATION JUSTICE JOURNEY PHOENIX, TUSCON, & NOGALES, AZ

Engage directly with organizations and individuals deeply involved in both the impact and regulation of migrant flows from the United States to Mexico.

Essential Questions

In what ways do the perspectives and roles of activists, homeland security agents, border patrol, humanitarians, and state officials contribute to the complexity of the immigration issue, and how do they intersect or conflict with each other?

What is the Jewish obligation to welcome and care for the stranger?

Judaic Context

God said to Abraham, "Go forth from your native land and from your father's house to the land that I will show you." (Genesis 12:1). We are a fugitive people. From the very beginning of our origin story, we were immigrants, moving from our native land to have a better life.

"This land you shall divide for yourselves among the tribes of Israel. You shall allot it as a heritage for yourselves and the gerim (strangers) who reside among you and have begotten children among you. You shall treat them as Israelite citizens; they shall receive allotments along with you among the tribes of Israel. You shall give the ger (stranger) an allotment within the tribe where he resides – declares the Lord God" (Ezekial 47:21-23). The Hebrew word ger (stranger) can also be translated as foreigner. Even the most foreign amongst you in your country have legal rights and the right to prosper and become part of the society by owning land.

The stranger who resides with you shall be to you as one of your citizens; you shall love them as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. (Leviticus 19:34) There are three most vulnerable categories of people in the Torah, the orphan, widow, and stranger. The book of priestly rules (Leviticus) says the most vulnerable among us are treated as citizens and are to be loved as we love ourselves.

SAMPLE ITINERARY*



Days 1 & 2: Phoenix, AZ

Our immersive experience will take you to the forefront of immigration justice, where you'll engage with local experts, visit immigration centers, and partake in meaningful discussions that shed light on the complexities of this critical issue. You'll have the unique opportunity to hear firsthand accounts, share perspectives, and gain a deeper understanding of the challenges immigrants and refugees face in this region. Amidst exploring these pressing matters, you'll also have the chance to enjoy the city's rich cultural diversity, savor delicious local cuisine, and forge lasting connections with fellow travelers who share your passion for positive change. Be a part of this transformative adventure as we uncover the stories, cultures, and struggles that shape the immigration landscape in Phoenix, ultimately inspiring change and empathy for a more just world.



Days 3 & 4: Tuscon and Nogales, AZ

Visit Nogales to experience the realities of the U.S.-Mexico border firsthand. Gain a deeper understanding of the challenges faced by migrants and the efforts of those working on both sides of the border. Hear from a border patrol agent and listen to personal stories from individuals who have crossed the border, all while standing in the heart of this unique region where immigration issues are vividly brought to light.

In Tucson, you'll engage with local advocates deeply committed to immigration justice. You'll have the opportunity to visit and volunteer at humanitarian aid centers, providing a firsthand understanding of the critical work being done to support vulnerable populations. Additionally, you'll participate in a migrant desert walk, gaining a deeper appreciation for the challenges those seeking a better life face. Throughout it all, you'll explore the dynamic cultural tapestry that thrives in this border city, making for an educational and emotionally impactful experience that will stay with you long after our journey ends.

Essential Questions

Do we have a unique responsibility to our neighboring countries merely because of our proximity?

What does fair trade mean and why should we care?

How does the Jewish Value of Ahavat Yisrael (love for the people of Israel) link us to the Jewish people in our broader community?

Jewish Values Highlighted on This Experience

Tzedek (Justice): Emphasizing social justice aligns with the Jewish value of Tzedek.

Chesed (Compassion): Showing compassion towards the children in the orphanage and empowering the people reflects the Jewish value of Chesed.

Tikun Olam (Repairing the World): Commitment to social change, education, and resource access resonates with the Jewish principle of Tikun Olam, the act of repairing and improving the world.

Gemilut Chasadim (Acts of Loving Kindness): Engagement with the orphanage and efforts to shed light on untold stories exemplify the Jewish value of performing acts of loving kindness.

Ahavat Yisrael (Love for Israel): The focus on the cultural and social aspects of Guatemala can be linked to the broader Jewish value of Ahavat Yisrael, encompassing love and concern for the Jewish people and the broader community.

Kehillah (Community): Exploring the local community, its challenges, and efforts to empower it align with the Jewish value of fostering a strong sense of community (Kehillah).

City Life & Chicken Buses

Experience the charm of Guatemala City through the lens of "Chicken Buses" – colorful, repurposed American school buses. Marvel at their neon paint jobs, religious slogans, and the unique journey that brings them from the United States to the winding roads of Guatemala. As we traverse the city, we glimpse into the lives of the local people on crowded buses and refurbished pickup trucks. Witness the daily commute of women and children, contemplating the stories and experiences that accompany each traveler. Uncover the value of individual stories as you peer into the lives of those who share your journey.



Untold Narratives

Meet our knowledgeable guides whose stories are deeply rooted in Mayan villages. Learn about their experiences, from leaving for America during a civil war to returning to their homeland. Explore the rich history of Santa Cruz and discover the unseen social change occurring in isolated rural towns.



Bearing Witness

Emotionally moving experiences unveil the untold stories of the people of Guatemala, whose tales often go unnoticed. Witness the impact of fair trade coffee plantations, women's weaving cooperatives, and more as we shed light on the unheard stories, bringing attention to the challenges faced by these remarkable people.

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ECHOES OF RESILIENCE: JEWISH IMMIGRATION JOURNEY NYC

Journey through the heart of New York City as we walk in the footsteps of Jewish Immigrants, celebrating their cultural contributions and finding inspiration for the ongoing fight for social justice. As we engage with immigrants' stories of perseverance and advocacy, we will draw connections to today's movements for equality and human rights. Enjoy activities such as catching a Broadway show, eating delicious food and visiting iconic sites throughout Manhattan ensuring a well-rounded and unforgettable New York experience. Join us in exploring how the past continues to inspire and inform the present, making this a journey of both discovery and reflection.

Essential Questions

How did Jewish immigrants shape the cultural, social, and economic landscape of New York City during the late 19th and early 20th centuries?

What challenges and opportunities did Jewish immigrants face as they navigated their identity between maintaining religious and cultural traditions and adapting to American society?

How have Jewish immigrant experiences in New York contributed to broader movements for social justice and civil rights, both historically and today?

Judaic Context

Pirkei Avot (Teachings of our Ancestors) emphasizes community building and ethical responsibility, which Jewish immigrants brought with them as they contributed to the social fabric of NYC through philanthropy, labor movements, and cultural institutions.

Emma Lazarus' poetry reflects the Jewish immigrant perspective and contributed to the American ethos of welcoming refugees and immigrants, embodied in the inscription at the Statue of Liberty.

The story of Ruth, a Moabite woman who becomes part of the Jewish people, reflects themes of adaptation, belonging, and the negotiation of dual identities, paralleling the Jewish immigrant experience.

The Exodus story, told every Passover, is a central narrative of migration, resilience, and the search for freedom, mirroring the Jewish immigrant journey from oppression in Europe to new opportunities in America.

Deuteronomy 16:20 – "Justice, justice you shall pursue" (Tzedek, tzedek tirdof)
This verse has been a foundation for Jewish involvement in social justice movements, including labor rights and civil rights, which were significant concerns for Jewish immigrants in New York.

Obligation to Care for the Poor: Mishnah Pe'ah 8:7 outlines the Jewish laws of tzedakah (charity), underscoring the communal responsibility toward the poor and vulnerable, a principle that drove Jewish involvement in social welfare and immigrant aid.

SAMPLE ITINERARY*



Setting the Tone

The day begins with a welcome session, including introductions and an overview of the objectives and itinerary. After lunch, the group will visit Ellis Island and view the Statue of Liberty, followed by a tour of the World Trade Center Museum. Dinner will be enjoyed together, and the day concludes with an evening sightseeing activity before saying goodnight.



Lower East Side and Welcoming Shabbat

Our Lower East Side walking tour includes visits to the Eldridge Street and Bialystoker Synagogues. After lunch, explore the Tenement Museum, then experience Kabbalat Shabbat and enjoy dinner at a local synagogue before ending the day with a peaceful goodnight.



Historical and Religious Exploration

Participate in a Jewish Harlem walking tour and lunch in Hell's Kitchen. After enjoying a Broadway show and experiencing the energy of Times Square, the evening concludes with Havdallah and a stunning view from "The Edge."



Cultural Contributions and Advocacy

The day begins with a social justice-guided tour at the Jewish Museum, followed by insightful meetings with activists, advocates, and change-makers. Afterward, enjoy a scenic walk along the Highline to Chelsea Market for lunch before heading to the airport to conclude the experience.

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ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE JOURNEY NORTHERN CALIFORNIA

Essential Questions

How do Jewish teachings on environmental stewardship, such as bal tashchit (do not waste), align with and support indigenous principles of living in harmony with the land?

In what ways can Jewish communities contribute to addressing contemporary environmental challenges such as water management, sustainable agriculture, and climate resilience, particularly in partnership with indigenous communities?

What role does the Jewish concept of shmita (sabbatical year) play in promoting sustainable land use, and how can it inform our relationship with the earth and indigenous land rights in modern-day environmental movements?

How can acknowledging and honoring the ancestral lands of indigenous tribes deepen our understanding of tzedek (justice) and tikkun olam (repairing the world) in the context of environmental and social justice?

Judgic Context

Teachings on environmental stewardship and indigenous principles include the law of Baal Taschit (do not waste) found in Deuteronomy 20:19-20.

Genesis 2:15 reminds us of humanity's responsibility to guard and tend the earth.

Leviticus 25:1-7 Shmita (Sabbatical Year) and The story of Honi the Circle Maker in Taanit 23a illuminate themes of collaborating on water management, sustainable agriculture, and climate resilience.

The Jewish concepts of rest and indigenous land rights are discussed in Leviticus 25:23 "The Land is Mine; You are but Strangers and Sojourners with Me."

Mishnah Sanhedrin 4:5 teaches the value of every life.

Acknowledging ancestral lands and pursuing justice are taught in Isaiah 58:6-7 which describes the true meaning of fasting.

Deuteronomy 16:20 "Justice, justice you shall pursue" (Tzedek, tzedek tirdof)







SAMPLE ITINERARY*



Day 1: Arrival and Introduction

We begin with an interactive workshop focused on understanding environmental justice issues in Northern California, with discussions on indigenous rights, land conservation, and sustainable practices. The group will then visit a local environmental organization for a guided tour and hands-on activities. Afterward, a group discussion explores the intersection of environmental justice, indigenous rights, and Jewish values. Dinner will be enjoyed at a sustainable restaurant with locally sourced ingredients, followed by an evening reflection session where participants share personal insights from the day's experiences.



Day 2: Exploring Nature & Indigenous Perspectives

Start the day with a guided hike through a redwood forest, led by an indigenous guide who will share the cultural significance of the redwoods and the importance of preserving these ancient ecosystems. A picnic lunch will be enjoyed in a scenic outdoor setting, followed by an interactive storytelling session where indigenous elders share traditional stories and legends, highlighting their deep connection to the land. After after dinner and free time, the evening concludes with a gathering featuring indigenous cultural activities and music.



Day 3: Sustainable Agriculture and Community Engagement

visit a local organic farm, participating in hands-on experiences in sustainable agriculture through activities like planting, harvesting, caring for animals and composting as we learn about food sovereignty and the importance of access to healthy food in marginalized communities. Lunch will feature farm-to-table cuisine made with ingredients from the local farm. In the afternoon, visit Point Reyes Station, home to over 1500 plant and animal speicies as well as many different indigenous cultures over thousands of years. Here, we will focus on the connections between sustainable agriculture, community empowerment, and environmental justice. The day ends with dinner and evening entertainment featuring local performers or cultural presentations.

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SOCIAL JUSTICE JOURNEY LOS ANGELES, CA

Journey through the heart of Los Angeles on this socially conscious adventure, where you will explore the intersection of activism, culture, and compassion. From thought-provoking conversations with grassroots organizers to immersive experiences shedding light on societal challenges, this trip invites you to uncover the stories that shape the city's quest for equity. You will be inspired to be a catalyst for change in your community.

Essential Questions

What assumptions do we make about those who hold a different identity from us?

What are some of the root causes of the social justice issues we face today?

What is the Jewish obligation to welcome and care for the "other"?

Judaic Context

Do not judge your fellow until you have reached their place. Do not say something that cannot be heard, for in the end it will be heard. (Perkei Avot 2:4) We can't know anyone else's story except our own. So we cannot judge a person whom we don't have shared experiences with.

Humanity began with one person, Adam, so that no one could say to another, "My ancestors are greater than yours. (Mishna Sanhedrin 4:5)

Becoming a resident of a city—becoming a "citizen"—is defined by assuming the obligations of the city. These are varied: "At 30 days [one is assessed for] the soup-kitchen, at three months—the welfare fund, at six months—the clothing fund, at nine—the burial fund, at twelve—the city's infrastructure. (Babylonian Talmud, Bava Batra 8a)

The test of faith is whether I can make space for difference. Can I recognize God's image in someone who is not in my image, whose language, faith, and ideals, are different from mine? If I cannot, then I have made God in my image instead of allowing him to remake me in his. (Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks)

THEMES



Sanctuary

"Sukkat Shalom" is a Hebrew phrase that translates to "Shelter of Peace." The spirit of Sukkat Shalom emphasizes the significance of creating spaces of peace, both physically and spiritually. For individuals navigating the harsh realities of life on the streets, battling the complexities of addiction, bravely seeking a second chance, refugees escaping conflict, survivors of trauma, or anyone grappling with the isolating shadows of loneliness, a sanctuary embodies more than just physical shelter—it embodies hope, empathy, and the chance for renewal. Sanctuary is a theme that weaves its way through our LA Experience as we delve into the heart of a variety of social justice issues, engage in impactful service work, connect with influential community leaders, converse with those with lived experience, and immerse ourselves in LA's vibrant and diverse neighborhoods to gain a deeper understanding of the dynamic efforts shaping the landscape of social justice in Los Angeles.



Understanding Homelessness

Join us for a unique and eye-opening experience in downtown Los Angeles. Our gentrification walking tour of DTLA and visit to Skid Row will give you a firsthand understanding of the issues facing the city's homeless population. You'll have the opportunity to meet with individuals experiencing homelessness and learn about several non-profits and social enterprises making a positive impact on their lives. This immersive experience will shed light on the complex challenges facing this community and inspire you to take action in your own way.



Exploring Food & Environmental Justice

Participants engage with the concepts of food deserts and food injustice in Los Angeles through the experience of getting our hands dirty in a community garden, eating at a restaurant whose mission is to provide healthy food at a low cost to under-resourced neighborhoods, and learning about sustainable living by making our own pickles. A hike led by a naturalist helps participants understand the importance of caring for the land and learning to appreciate all the land has to offer us.



T'shuvah - Second Chances

Visit a park that was once marred by gang-related violence but is now a peaceful haven with a new basketball court, soccer field, and playgrounds where we will meet with folks who share their journeys from incarceration and gangs to owning businesses and giving back to the community. Eat at a restaurant run by Homeboy Industries, an organization that supports gang members' reintegration into the workforce, and meet a chaplain in the California prison system who will impart invaluable insights into the human spirit and the power of redemption. At Beit T'Shuvah, a rehabilitation center rooted in the spiritual principles of Judaism, we meet with residents to discuss pressing topics such as loneliness, isolation, addiction, loss, and connection following a pandemic.



LGBTQIA+

Participants will gain an understanding of the work being done in LA to become more understanding and inclusive of the LGBTQIA+ community as we visit the first Gay and Lesbian synagogue, the first AIDS Memorial in Los Angeles, and relevant nonprofits and businesses supporting the rights and needs of LGBTQIA+ communities.



Jewish Los Angeles

Explore LA's vibrant "Kosher Corridor" through a scavenger hunt, unveiling the tastes, sights, and rich history of this neighborhood that serves the 5th largest Jewish community in the world. Enjoy lunch from your choice of a variety of kosher eateries.



Immigration Justice

Participants will learn from immigrants and refugees, meet immigration attorneys and leaders who run non-profits to assist immigrants and refugees, attend a portrait drawing workshop, and dine at a restaurant owned by refugees.



Exploring Racial Justice

We will delve deeply into the forgotten history of Santa Monica as we meet a historian and activist who is black and has grown up in Santa Monica. She will share with us her memories of spending her childhood on segregated beaches and enlighten us about the changes that have taken place in her once black-owned neighborhood. As we follow in her footsteps, we will learn about red lining and the loss of this community's generational wealth as well as her leading role in working with the city of Santa Monica to compensate the black community for the loss of black-owned homes and businesses.



Thrift Shopping with a Purpose

Participants will study Jewish forms of giving and learn that the highest form of giving is enabling someone to be self-sufficient. This concept comes to life as we learn about the difference between a social enterprise and a traditional non-profit by shopping at thrift stores, visiting restaurants with a purpose, and and meeting the people who work at the organizations these businesses support. Single Day Experiences

Tzedek America will provide your group powerful local social justice experiences throughout the school year. Each program is based on a specific theme of your choosing. A professional educator and Tzedek America-trained tour guide will lead each field trip. Each trip includes a complete lesson plan for your teacher to use in class the week before our trip, a personalized field guide for each student that includes Jewish and secular texts, resources for further exploration of our theme, space for reflection, and a parent newsletter with photos, sharing highlights of our time together.

Every Experience Includes

Lesson Plans

Lesson plans are provided to the synagogue for each social justice topic to set the tone for the upcoming trip. The lesson is written by Tzedek America and sent to the synagogue educator for use in the classroom the week prior to the trip. The synagogue educator teaches the lesson. If you would like the lesson led by Tzedek America, there is an additional fee for each per lesson.



Debriefing

Debriefing allows participants to process and learn from each other in a safe and structured space. The Tzedek America team will provide resources and tools to enable your staff to facilitate reflection on what was learned and how it can be applied to daily life, deepening participants' appreciation and understanding of their experience.



Follow Up Newsletter

After each day trip, your Tzedek America trip leader will create a one-page newsletter that can be sent to the students and their families. The newsletter will summarize the day trip's events and activities, giving the whole family insight into the experience. The newsletter will also feature photos from our trip, highlighting the learning and fun that took place.



Field Guides

Our field guides provide participants with the scaffolding needed to elevate each experience by intertwining historical context, relevant terminology, and Jewish texts. These guides serve as an educational resource, a tool with prompts for debriefing, journal space to record thoughts and feelings, QR codes for further research on the places and topics we explore, and a way to keep in touch with the people and organizations we meet on our journey.



Our son Charlie traveled to Guatemala with Tzedek America in the winter of 8th grade. If I said it was a life-changing experience that would be an understatement. He experienced everything we hoped for and more. Traveling with friends abroad, independent of us, while spending time with people in another culture, building bunk beds for underprivileged children, shopping in the local markets, and seeing the Jewish community in another country – where they spoke different languages at the door but a shared common language in prayer – was revelatory for him, and helped him develop more keenly a sense of himself and his place in the world for sure. And the cliff-diving and chocolate-making were just a couple of exceedingly creative activities Tzedek America programmed for them, always balancing the immersive experiences with the fun.

As things would turn out, this was a year before the pandemic. We couldn't have foreseen the circumstances that would play out in the coming months, but in hindsight, this trip was instrumental in his ability to navigate the lockdown. When he came home from the trip he seemed to have grown, not just physically, but he had a greater sense of who he was, and this helped keep him grounded as things shifted beneath his feet. He kept in touch with a number of his friends from the trip online. His experience with Tzedek America also informed his desire to help others who were struggling with the isolation - - and his understanding, during the challenges presented by online classes, that there was a world outside his shoes, and outside of his bedroom.

Now that he is back in school in-person, he still talks about the trip as **one of the most eye-opening experiences** he's had. We were grateful for the opportunity to be able to send him on the trip at the time. Looking back, we are even more grateful now that we did.

I never pictured the hotel room where Dr. King spent his final moments. Never imagined the bridge in Selma, where Bloody Sunday took place. Never envisioned the lynching memorial in Montgomery and was never able to feel the gravity of the thousands who were lynched, seeing their names, hearing their stories. But most importantly, I never considered how these things would impact me.

On this trip, we did not just hear stories, see images, or discuss places where historically significant events occurred. We felt them. We experienced them. And to me, that is powerful.

We have seen that history is written on the walls of the south. And obviously when I say that, I mean it literally and figuratively. When I think of those words, I think of the EJI museum we went to yesterday in Montgomery- where in one of the exhibits, there was a section of a brick wall from the 1800s, which was made by slave labor. I think of the plaques scattered around museums, memorials, and sidewalks, acknowledging and honoring this history, showing an effort to never forget it. But I also think of how within every southerner, there is a truth. If they are white, it's a truth that they, though perhaps not directly, have been complicit in a society which facilitated exploitation, violence, and discrimination. If they are black, it's a truth that the places they call home were built on a foundation of their own people's oppression. And on this trip I realized that this truth can never be erased, only addressed.

Though this experience wasn't designed to be fun- it was meant to be heavy and impactful- sharing this trip with my class, and having some fun times, has made learning about painful history a bit less painful. Ending our day with friends in our hotel and even teachers has enriched this experience.

Though in the end, I think I leave understanding. I understand that I will never know the fear an African American must endure when doing many of the things we do everyday. I understand that history must be addressed, in order to heal, and progress. And I understand the importance of facing truths which may be unpleasant.

And I think in our participation, in our willingness to confront what we have learned head-on, we have shown that we all want to understand. And in that strive to know, to learn, and ultimately, to understand, to me, something essential happens. The desire to take action, and make a change, is born.
